## About McKinney-Vento

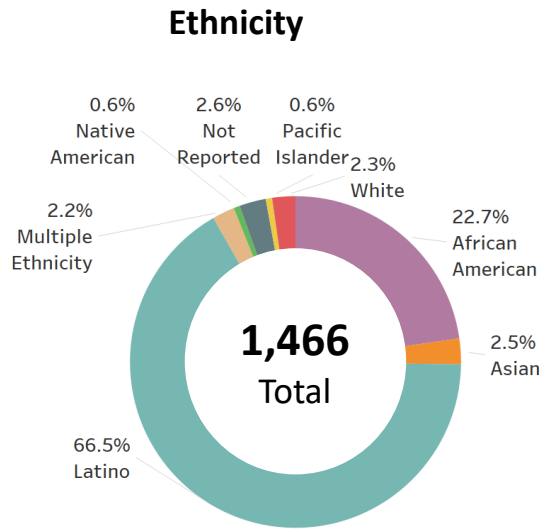
McKinney-Vento is a federal law that provides immediate enrollment to unhoused students.

The program provides supplemental educational services and social supports to youth and families who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence.

This means students sharing housing with one or more families, living in emergency or transitional shelters, staying in hotels/motels, trailer parks/campgrounds, or somewhere not designated for sleeping. This can also include unaccompanied youth (students not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian).

The services provided by our program include enrollment assistance, school supplies, tutoring, backpacks, advocacy, housing referrals and assistance with transportation.

Nearly **45%** of housing insecure youth are former newcomer youth or US born emancipated youth. **42%** are Newcomers.

**66%** (132 of 201) of housing insecure high school seniors graduated<sup>2</sup>

## Housing

**76%** of housing insecure students were temporarily doubled up. Other students lived in temporary shelters (11%), hotels/motels (7%), or were temporarily unsheltered (6%). Housing status unknown for less than 1% of students.

**15 families** secured permanent housing in 2021-22.

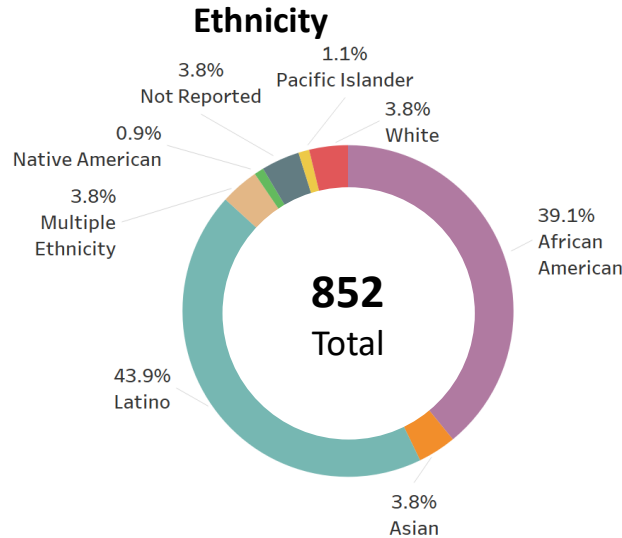

## Housing

61% of housing insecure youth are students were temporarily doubled up. Other students lived in temporary shelters (17%), hotels/motels (12%), or were temporarily unsheltered (10%). Housing status was unknown for 1% of the students.

15 families in permanent housing in 2021-22.

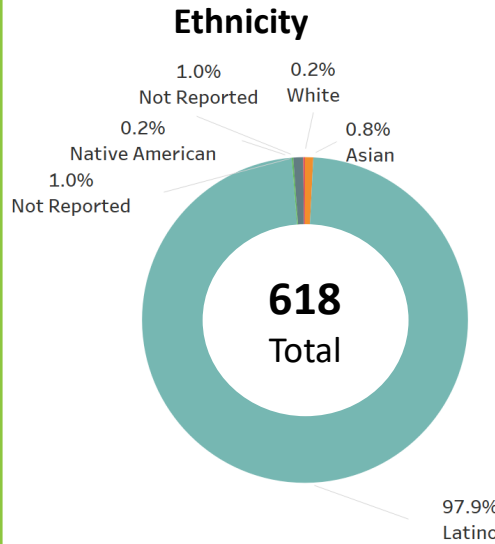

A Newcomer is defined as a student who has been in the United States for less than 3 years and who speaks a language other than English at home.

## Housing

**96%** of housing insecure newcomer students were temporarily doubled up. Other students lived in temporary shelters (2%), were temporarily unsheltered. (1%) or lived in hotels/motels (0.5%).
